The top 100 list was compiled from a national survey conducted by a polling agency.



PERMACULTURE The Permaculture Promise by Jono Neiger. Each story is linked together to tell the story of ordinary lives that are affected by the regions heavily armed, ruleof-law, libertarian, religious separatist and survivalist movement






Including a menu of tempting recipes, Cleo Coyle's Shot in the Dark is a fun yet gripping murder mystery. One of the Coffeehouse Mystery series, the book is set in Clare Cosi's café, where everyone seems to be on the Smartphone dating craze. Then a corpse is found, and one of the "swipers" is arrested; but is it the right person?

Time Was by Ian McDonald is a complex love story across time. In this slim book, Two soldiers fall in love in the heart of WWII, but when an accident occurs and the two vanish, they must hunt each other across the decades. A book dealer in the present time, finds notes that they leave for each other in the same book, and pursues the mystery of Tom and Ben.





Outpost by W. Michael Gear (#1 Donovan trilogy) is a riveting science fiction read full of death cult ships, ruthless corporate entities, murder and mayhem. "It's *Predator* meets *Avatar* with a gritty touch of *Deadwood* tossed in to keep things interesting. -SYFY Wire

The Purloining of Prince Oleomargarine by Mark Twain and Philip & Erin Stead

This story is a never-before-published, previously unfinished Mark Twain children's story brought to life by Caldecott Medal winners Philip & Erin

Using some fairy tale elements, the story is about a boy who can talk to animals, and how he uses that ability to stop some royal rulers.

The story is paired with large, beautiful illustrations. The underlying themes are about kindness, acceptance, and loving your neighbors, a message that is always welcome for youngsters and oldsters alike.

My favorite quote from this book: "There are many accidents of biology that are beyond our control. Some of us are short, some of us are tall. Some of us are weak, some of us are strong. Thankfully, though, personalities are not born ugly; they are learned ugly."

Early Literacy Tip: Writing

At Home – When coloring or scribbling, encourage your child to write as much as he can about what they're drawing. This will help them understand that written words stand for spoken language.

On the Go – While waiting in line or at the doctor's office, do a simple finger play or rhyme that get their hands moving, such as "Itsy Bitsy Spider" or "Open Shut Them." Moving and stretching their fingers will help them build the fine motor skills they'll need to write and draw.

A "premise" is a proposition which forms the basis of a theory. "The premise of the book" means the idea on which the book is postulated.




A "premises" is a building on a tract of land. The plural of "premises" is "premises". One Premises. Many Premises. (Like "sheep", there is no different singular or plural.)


Death Café Tuesday, August 21 at 5 pm
